Memorandum of Regulations and Application Form THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, 2006

GENERAL REGULATIONS:

Rhodes Scholarships are tenable at the University of Oxford, and are normally held for two years, the duration of most master's degrees and bachelor's degrees for those who already have another bachelor's degree. Scholars may do a single one-year degree only, depending upon the degree program pursued by the Scholar, or may do two one-year degrees, but may not in the latter instance receive a third year's funding. A Scholarship may be renewed, at the complete discretion of the Rhodes Trustees, for a third and final year for those who initially embark on a doctoral route at the time of admission and whose progress is deemed satisfactory. Scholars may not apply for an MBA. The Rhodes Trustees reserve the right to make changes in degree eligibility, funding, and other aspects of the Scholarship program at any time.

Thirty-two Scholarships are assigned annually to the United States of America. States are grouped into sixteen districts for the purpose of making these appointments. Each District Committee selects not more than two candidates who will represent the state or states within each district as Rhodes Scholars at Oxford. The names of Scholarship winners are announced at the close of the District Committee meetings. No alternates are selected.

After the successful candidates' election to Scholarships, the Warden of Rhodes House in Oxford seeks places for the Rhodes Scholars-elect in the departments and faculties and colleges of the University, following the candidates' preferences insofar as possible. Because the departments and colleges make their own admissions, there is no guarantee of a place in a particular department or college. All decisions on places rest in the hands of the University and the colleges. The award of the Scholarship is not confirmed by the Rhodes Trustees until the Scholar-elect has been accepted for admission by a faculty or department and by a college. Rhodes Scholars elected in November 2006 will enter the University of Oxford in October 2007. Scholars are required to be full-time students at Oxford for the duration of their degree programs. Deferment of the Scholarship is not allowed, nor may Scholars go off stipend during their scholarship tenure and return to stipend at a later date.

The value of a Rhodes Scholarship consists of a direct payment to the Scholar's college of all tuition fees (such as matriculation, tuition, laboratory fees, and certain other set charges), plus a maintenance stipend of not less than £9,840 per annum paid directly to the Scholar in installments during the term of the Scholarship. The sum provided should be sufficient to enable a Scholar to meet necessary expenses for term time and vacations, but those who can afford to supplement it to a modest extent from their own resources are advised to do so. The Rhodes Trustees will assist successful applicants with their traveling expenses to and from Oxford. Married applicants should bear in mind that the Scholarship stipend is sufficient only for one person, and that the Trust takes no financial responsibility for the support of a Scholar's spouse.

The tenure of a Rhodes Scholarship is dependent upon the maintenance of a standard of work and conduct, which, in the opinion of the Trustees, justifies the Scholarship. Tenure of other awards in conjunction with a Rhodes Scholarship is not permitted without prior consultation with the Warden of Rhodes House.

CONDITIONS OF ELIGIBILITY:

Applicants apply as a representative of one of the fifty states: either in the state in which they will have received at least two years of college training *and* a bachelor's degree before October 1, 2007, or in the state where they were legally resident on April 15, 2006. (Applicants are warned that selection committees are instructed to verify legal residence.) Simultaneous application to more than one District Committee will disqualify an applicant. At the time of application:

1. An applicant must be a citizen of the United States; pending application for citizenship does not qualify a person to apply.
2. An applicant, by October 1, 2006, must be at least 18 but not yet 24 years of age. (Applicants will be eligible who were born after October 1, 1982 and on or before October 1, 1988.)
3. An applicant must have achieved academic standing sufficiently advanced to assure completion of a bachelor's degree before October 1, 2007.

BASIS OF SELECTION:

In considering applications, Committees of Selection will have regard to those qualities which Cecil Rhodes expressly listed in order to define the type of Scholar he desired.

Proven intellectual and academic achievement of a high standard is the first quality required of applicants, but they will also be required to show integrity of character, interest in and respect for their fellow beings, the ability to lead, and the energy to use their talents to the full.

Mr. Rhodes believed that the last of these qualities was best tested through participation and success in sports. Participation in organized sports is not essential if applicants are able to demonstrate in other ways the physical vigor which will enable Rhodes Scholars to make an effective contribution to the world around them. Mr. Rhodes clearly expected such a contribution when he expressed the hope that Rhodes Scholars would come to "esteem the performance of public duties as [their] highest aim." From this statement one may infer that he expected his Scholars to play an influential part in the betterment of society, wherever their careers might take them. It does not necessarily presuppose a career in the public sector. Mr. Rhodes desired that his Scholars be intellectually, morally, and physically capable of leadership in any field.

Much of the distinctiveness of the Rhodes Scholarship arises from this comprehensive set of criteria. Intellectual excellence is obviously required, but not in isolation from other qualities. Mr. Rhodes sought Scholars who were more than "mere bookworms;" he wanted their intellectual talents to be combined with concern for others. Thus the Committees of Selection assign the highest importance to this blend of character with intellect.

Financial need gives no special claim to a Rhodes Scholarship. Moreover, the Will lays down that "no student shall be qualified or disqualified for election to a Scholarship on account of race or religious opinions."

In the absence of a sufficiently qualified candidate, a Committee of Selection will make no nomination.

METHOD OF APPLYING:

Application, using the form in this Memorandum and furnishing the material specified, should be made to the Secretary of the appropriate District Committee of Selection as early as possible, and **in no case will an application with a postmark later than October 2, 2006 be accepted.** A list of Secretaries of District Committees of Selection is printed in this Memorandum.

A preliminary elimination will be made in all Districts on the basis of credentials. Committees of Selection will then invite selected applicants to a personal interview; no Scholar will be selected without such interview. Committees of Selection will meet on November 17 and 18, 2006.

PLEASE NOTE: Applicants must pay their own expenses in appearing before Committees of Selection.

STANDING AT OXFORD:

A degree from an approved American college or university normally entitles an American Rhodes Scholar on arrival in Oxford to "Senior Status." Senior Status carries with it exemption from all examinations at Oxford prior to the "Final Honour Schools" (for the degree of B.A.) which may be taken with such status, and for most but not all B.A. degrees, after two years' residence. An appropriate undergraduate major is required for admission to a higher degree (beyond that of B.A.). Rhodes Scholars-elect wishing to pursue either a postgraduate degree or a second B.A. degree must communicate with the Warden of Rhodes House who will seek on their behalf acceptance by a faculty or department and by a college. The substantial majority of United States Rhodes Scholars now undertake graduate work at Oxford, usually pursuing masters' degrees.

Two samples of recent written work, approximately 2,000 words each, are required for admission to read for any degree in any subject other than a mathematical or scientific subject. These samples are only required of those elected to a Rhodes Scholarship.

COURSES OPEN TO RHODES SCHOLARS:

Subject to the consent of their colleges and as long as it may be completed with Senior Status within two years, Scholars may read for the Oxford Bachelor of Arts in any of the Final Honour Schools. See the online *University of Oxford Undergraduate Prospectus*, available at www.admin.ox.ac.uk/usp. With the consent of the relevant departments or faculties and their colleges, Scholars may be admitted, if qualified by previous training, to read for any higher degrees offered by the University except for the MBA, including the Bachelor of Philosophy, Master of Philosophy, Master of Letters, Master of Science by Research, or Doctor of Philosophy. These graduate degrees are the choice of most Rhodes Scholars. With the consent of the relevant faculties and their colleges, they may also read for one-year Master of Science by Coursework or Master of Studies degrees, or other one-year degrees that are offered by the University. The most complete and current listing of graduate degrees is in the *University of Oxford Graduate Studies Prospectus*, available at www.admin.ox.ac.uk/gsp. Instructions will be given to applicants who are elected to Rhodes Scholarships about the two samples of recent written work which are required for admission to these programs.

PLEASE NOTE: It is very difficult, and may be impossible, to change degree courses after admission to Oxford. Course selection requires careful consideration.

INFORMATION ABOUT OXFORD:

Applicants should study the academic system of the University of Oxford in order to determine if their plan of study is one which is feasible at Oxford. The best sources of information are the current issues of the *University of Oxford Undergraduate Prospectus* and *Graduate Studies Prospectus*, available on the University's web site, www.ox.ac.uk. In addition, the Oxford University *Examination Decrees* is available for a charge from the Oxford University Press, 116 High Street, Oxford OX1 4BZ, England. Additional information is available from the United States Rhodes Scholarship web site at www.rhodesscholar.org, which has a link to the University's site. Copies of a brochure, *Oxford and the Rhodes Scholarships*, giving information about the Scholarships and life and study at Oxford, may be obtained from Institutional Representatives as well as from the Office of the American Secretary. Its content is also available from the United States Rhodes Scholarship web site.

Application Procedures

I. Institutional Endorsement

The applicant must be endorsed by an institution where he or she will have completed two years of full-time undergraduate study and received a bachelor's degree before October 1, 2007, or by their graduate institution. It is preferred that applicants in their first year of graduate study receive an endorsement from the undergraduate institution from which they received their degree; for those in their second or later year of graduate study, the preference is for the endorsement to come from the graduate institution. The "Institutional Endorsement" form (Pages A-2 and A-3) must be supplied by the applicant to the president, dean, or other official responsible for graduate fellowships who will then send it directly to the Secretary of the relevant District Committee of Selection.

THE INSTITUTIONAL ENDORSEMENT MUST ARRIVE NO LATER THAN OCTOBER 10, 2006.

II. Letters of Appraisal

The applicant must give each person asked to write on his or her behalf a reproduction of the attached "Request for Letter of Appraisal" form (Page A-4), and request that they send **TEN** copies of their letters directly to the Secretary of the relevant District Committee of Selection.

THE LETTERS OF APPRAISAL MUST ARRIVE NO LATER THAN OCTOBER 10, 2006.

III. Applicant Materials

The applicant must submit TEN sets of the following materials. One set should be marked as **Original** and should contain the originals of each of the requested documents. The other nine sets may be photocopies. Each set of materials should be arranged in the following order and should not be stapled. Please note that the application process for the Rhodes Scholarships requires that the applicant must personally submit these items; institutions may not submit these items on behalf of the applicant. It is advised that applicants obtain proof of mailing.

1. The completed "Application Blank" (Page A-5), signed in ink.
2. A signed short personal statement describing the applicant's academic and other interests. This statement should describe the *specific area of proposed study* and the applicant's reasons for wishing to study at Oxford, and it must conclude with the following signed statement: "I certify that this essay is my own work." This personal essay *must not exceed* 1,000 words in length (approximately four double-spaced pages) and should be written in as simple and direct a manner as possible. It should be set in a typeface no smaller than 10 points. Selection Committees will place special emphasis on this personal essay, and it will be forwarded to Oxford colleges to which Rhodes Scholars-elect apply for admission.
3. A succinct pertinent list of principal activities and honors in college (including prizes, scholarships, offices held; athletic record; extracurricular interests and substantial activities) with dates. This must not exceed two pages in length, and should be set in a typeface no smaller than 10 points.
4. The applicant's college transcript. The copy attached to the Original **MUST** be certified by the Registrar or other responsible official; the other nine copies may be photocopies. If an applicant has attended more than one college or university, **one certified Original and nine copies** of all transcripts **MUST** be submitted.

PLEASE NOTE: Committees may, in their discretion, reject any personal statement or list of activities which fails to meet these requirements.

In addition, the following materials should be included with the set of materials marked **Original**:

1. **ONE photocopy** of the applicant's birth certificate, passport, or other proof of age and citizenship.
2. **TEN** copies of an unmounted head and shoulders photograph of the applicant (color or black and white, passport size or slightly larger, no photocopies) with the applicant's signature on the back of each. The photos must not be stapled to the application but should be submitted in an envelope clipped to the **Original** set. Amateur snapshots will not be accepted.

The applicant should retain one copy of the application blank, personal statement, list of principal activities and transcript in the event the application package is lost in transit.

WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.**

(PLEASE NOTE: If the applicant materials are delivered by hand, they must be received by October 2; if they are delivered by an express mail service, there must be proof of receipt by that service by October 2. Applicants are advised to obtain proof of mailing.)

Institutional Endorsement

The criteria which Mr. Rhodes set forth in his Will still guide Committees of Selection in their assessment of applicants. The Will contains four standards by which prospective Rhodes Scholars should be judged:

- (1) literary and scholastic attainments;
- (2) energy to use one's talents to the full, as exemplified by fondness for and success in sports;
- (3) truth, courage, devotion to duty, sympathy for and protection of the weak, kindness, unselfishness and fellowship;
- (4) moral force of character and instincts to lead, and to take an interest in one's fellow beings.

Proven intellectual and academic quality of a high standard is the first quality required of applicants. Beyond academic distinction, however, candidates will also be required to show integrity of character, interest in and respect for their fellow beings, the ability to lead, and the energy to use their talents to the full. The intellectual standard sought is very high. It is unlikely that a candidate will be successful unless he or she is sufficiently able academically to be admitted to one of America's most selective graduate schools.

Mr. Rhodes believed that the last of these qualities was best tested through participation and success in sports. Participation in organized sports is not essential if applicants are able to demonstrate in other ways the physical vigor which will enable Rhodes Scholars to make an effective contribution to the world around them. Mr. Rhodes clearly expected such a contribution when he expressed the hope that Rhodes Scholars would come to "esteem the performance of public duties as [their] highest aim." From this statement one may infer that he expected his Scholars to play an influential part in the betterment of society, wherever their careers might take them. The Committees of Selection for the Rhodes Scholarships will have available for study a copy of the applicant's academic transcript, a statement of the applicant's academic and other interests and reasons for wishing to study at Oxford, and a statement of extracurricular activities and interests. **A letter of evaluation providing additional information about the applicant, which the institution may submit with its endorsement, will be useful in assisting the Selection Committee's evaluation of the applicant, and will be helpful to the Oxford authorities in determining the Rhodes Scholar-elect's suitability for admission.**

While these evaluation letters are not required, experience suggests that such additional information from an institutional perspective may be quite advantageous to applicants.

Academic referees should note that their letters written on behalf of a successful applicant will be used by Oxford colleges for determining the Rhodes Scholar-elect's suitability for admission. Proven intellectual and academic quality of a high standard is the first quality required of applicants. The intellectual standard sought is very high. It is unlikely that a candidate will be successful unless he or she is sufficiently able academically to be admitted to one of America's most selective graduate schools.

It is not expected that you will be able to speak from first-hand knowledge of the applicant's qualifications under all those criteria. If you are primarily acquainted with the applicant through a teacher/pupil relationship, you are requested to concentrate particularly on academic quality and potential (bearing in mind that your reference will be used for admissions procedures at Oxford University), although your assessment of the other qualities will be very welcome to the Committee. If, on the other hand, you are better acquainted with the applicant through non-academic interests, you are requested to concentrate on assessment of character in the knowledge that the Committee is looking for persons who show promise of outstanding achievement in later life. Please do not hesitate to speak of the applicant's limitations as well as strong points. Committees tend naturally to be dubious of appraisals that imply a given individual has no limitations whatever.
